



The aim and scope of Perio is to publish articles relevant to the science and practice of periodontics and related areas. The goal is to create a communication network among dental professionals. Manuscripts describing clinical conditions, patient management, clinical experience, treatment procedures or techniques, new products and methods are welcome. All manuscripts will be peer reviewed. To be accepted by Perio, the articles must be original and written in English.

Within the scope the Journal will publish articles as mentioned below:

1. **Guest editorial** – as solicited by the Editorial Board
2. **Focus articles, Reviews** – presenting comprehensive, critical summaries of current knowledge in the field of periodontology and related disciplines. Also presenting an in-depth discussion on a clinical procedure or treatment approach.
3. **Clinical reports** – illustrating new aspects of periodontal practice.
4. **Research reports.**
5. **Commentaries** – addressing current or controversial aspects of periodontology and offering a hypothesis as well as an expert opinion on relevant clinical issues.
6. **Proceedings of symposia, workshops, or conferences.**
7. **Reports on new methods and products.**
8. **Letters to the Editor(s).**

Clinical reports. Articles submitted in this category should illustrate various aspects of periodontal practice with emphasis on the clinical management of the periodontal patient. Reports should describe unusual cases which may represent specific conditions or provide new information, new concepts or procedures in the field of periodontics or implant therapy. Unexpected observations associated with different conditions, as well as unexpected results and adverse treatment response should also be described. The general components of the article should be i) Introduction including a critical review of the literature ii) Case description and Results. Should include a detailed description of the case presented, all relevant data concerning the patient, the periodontal status and the specific site concerned. The clinical situation should be illustrated with high-quality coloured photographs, radiographs and drawings when indicated iii) Discussion. Should focus on the most important findings and should highlight possible implications for periodontal practice.

Research reports. The general components of the article should be i) Introduction detailing the aim and scope of the paper ii) Study design and Results. Should include a brief description of the material and methods used to provide the readers with a general view of the study. Results should be given in a concise manner iii) Discussion. Should focus on the most important findings and should highlight possible clinical implications.

Commentaries. Articles submitted in this category should address controversial issues related to periodontics and implant dentistry. The discussion should be balanced and based on current scientific evidence including also its limitations such as lack of evidence. All relevant references to the literature should be cited when appropriate. The paper should reflect the personal opinion of the author(s). On important clinical issues, different authors are encouraged to give their viewpoint. Commentaries should be concise and not exceed 2500 words.

MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION

The components of a manuscript should be: title page, key words, structured abstract, body of text, acknowledgements, illustrations (including legends) and tables.

- **Title page.** The first page should include the title of the article (descriptive but as concise as possible) and the full names, professional affiliation, and full address of all authors. Phone, fax, and e-mail address must also be provided for the corresponding author, who will be assumed to be the firstlisted author unless otherwise noted. If the paper was presented before an organised group, the name of the organisation, location, and date should be included.
- 3–5 key words.
- **Abstract.** Include a maximum 250-word abstract.
- **Body of text.** The purpose of reviews and focus articles is to present comprehensive, critical summaries of current knowledge in the field of periodontics or to offer expert opinion relevant to clinical issues. These articles are not scientific or research papers. They should be written in a style which is general and which appeals to a wide and varied audience. The components of the article should be: i) Introduction detailing the aim and scope of the paper ii) Major section, with subheadings, providing relevant background information, latest advances, and literature related to the topic iii) Conclusions summarising the evidence and current knowledge as well as evaluating the clinical importance.
- **Acknowledgements.** Acknowledge persons who have made substantive contributions to the study. Specify grant or other financial support.
- **Illustrations (including legends) and tables.** Must be numbered and cited in the text in order of appearance and submitted electronically (at least 300 dpi). Each illustration and table (including its corresponding legend) must be on a separate page. Illustrations, tables, photographs, radiographs on paper must be scanned and submitted electronically.

- **Abbreviations.** The full term for which an abbreviation stands should precede its first use in the text unless it is a standard unit of measurement.
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- All references must be cited in the text, using the Vancouver (numbered references) style. References should be marked in order of appearance with superscript numbers.
- The reference list should appear at the end of the article, in numerical sequence.

- Do not include unpublished data or personal communications in the reference list. Cite such references parenthetically in the text and include a date.
- Provide complete information for each reference, including names of all authors (up to six). If the reference is to part of a book, also include title of the chapter and names of the book's editor(s).

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3. One paper copy of the manuscript plus a floppy diskette or CD-ROM (mandatory) containing a PC-Word file of the manuscript text tables, and legends. Figures should be included on the disk if possible in any format that can be opened using Adobe Photoshop, (TIF, GIF, JPG, PSD, EPS etc.) or as Microsoft PowerPoint Documents (ppt).

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
